Spring is in full swing. Be safe and enjoy! Please read grilling safety tips from the State Fire Marshal's office.

Check for Leaks

"Check to make sure all the connections are tight and secure before firing up the gas grill for the first time this season," said Fire Marshal Ostroskey. "Using a brush, apply a soapy solution made of one part dish liquid and one part water to the tank connection. If the solution bubbles, you have a leak that needs repair," said Ostroskey. He recommended checking for and replacing any cracked hoses.

Rules Changed on Grills on Porches, Decks and Patios

"Recent changes to the State Fire Code clarify under what conditions it is safe to use grills on decks, balconies and patios," said State Fire Marshal Ostroskey. Grills can only be used on first floor porches, decks, or patios if there is an outdoor stairway to the ground, or the porch is at ground level. Grills are prohibited on any porch, balcony or deck that has a roof, or overhang. For more information, contact your local fire prevention office.

Place Grills Away from Buildings

Ostroskey said, "Place grills well away from the exterior of the house to keep any grill fire from also igniting a building. Last year, many of the grill fires started when the grill was placed right up against an exterior wall." The State Fire Code now clarifies that grills must be 10-feet away from the side of the building, unless the manufacturer instructions specifically state it can be used closer.

Safety First

- Read and follow the owner's manual.
- Always grill outdoors.
- Place grills 10-feet away from the house. Make sure they are not under eaves, overhanging branches or against the side of the building. Keep them away from deck railings.
- Grills can be used on open (no roof) first floor porches, decks or patios if there is an exterior stairway to the ground, or it is at ground level.
 - Grills should never be used indoors or on fire escapes.
 - Keep children and pets three feet away from the grill area. Create a circle of safety.
- Never leave a grill burning unattended.
- Keep the grill clean by removing grease or fat build-up from the grills and trays below the grill.
- If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.
- If the flame goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait 15 minutes before relighting.
- Never use gasoline on any grill!
- Call 911 for any emergency.

Shut Off the Gas at the Tank

After each use, and before disconnecting the propane tank, be sure to shut off the gas at the tank.

Reminder: dog license(s) update

DOG LICENSES: A reminder to people who have paid for their 2017-2018 dog licenses and have not picked them up yet please do so. I still have about twenty that are still in my office. The reason for them not being mailed to you is because there was no self addressed stamped envelope given at the time of registration. You can pick them up on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10-4:00. The 2018-2019 dog licenses are in. Your current dog license(s) will expire at the end of March. The new 2018-2019 licenses are in and available for you to license your dog(s). The cost of the license is \$6.00 if neutered and \$10.00 if un-neutered. A kennel license is required for anyone having more than four dogs. The cost is \$25.00 for the license plus \$5.00 for each neutered and \$6.00 for each un-neutered dogs. If you prefer to do it by mail you can include a copy



of this form, if you have more than one dog photocopy the form. I will need to have a copy of the current rabies certificate, along with a check made out to the Town on Montgomery. **MAKE SURE YOU INCLUDE A SELF ADDRESSED STAMPED ENVELOPE** or the license will not get mailed back to you. You may also call the Town Clerk to obtain a license in person. Forms are on the front table in the Town Hall and can be filled out there and dropped off.

The Town by-laws require ALL dogs be licensed by July 1st of current year or you will be fined a late fee of \$25.00 per dog, along with the license fee. All dogs six months or older, even inside dogs MUST be licensed. Call 862-4478 for more info.

June Garden birds

June in the garden is a month of results, when baby birds are finally posted out of nests to announce the fruits of their parents' labors. Parent birds encourage reluctant youngsters to leave the safety of the nest, while keen-eyed predators with their own hungry mouths to feed watch the newly fledged with anticipation. Everywhere there are youngsters facing up to their new lives with vigor and uncertain co-ordination in equal amounts - the newly fledged.

The actual leaving of a nest appears to be an agonizing experience for both young and adults. It normally happens in early morning, but can be highly drawn out. Perhaps the

youngsters feel as unready and unsteady as they look, for most baby birds show a considerable reluctance to make the 'leap of faith'. In their hesitation they might require considerable coaxing from their stressed-out parent or parents. The first day of leaving can be as perilous as any day a young bird will ever face. Starvation is a real possibility; young birds leaving the nest have precious few fat reserves and must find enough food on their first day. And they must also, of course, avoid predators.

Though most parents invest a great deal of effort into their chicks' welfare, that commitment is inevitably finite, and after a while attention will unconsciously turn to the adults' next breeding attempt.

If you have any plants to share for the Book and Plant sale June 9 at the Little School House on Pitcher Street, please contact Chris Brown 862 4591 before June 6th. Please label your plants. You can purchase great perennials, etc for your garden at a bargain price, so please come to the plant sale.



- In June :
- Monitor all recent plant transplants carefully for water needs until the root systems establish.
 - When thinning fruit trees, a good rule of thumb is one fruit per flower cluster.
 - Plastic mulches can improve yields of heat-loving veggies

like tomatoes, peppers and cukes.

- Most Lyme disease infections occur in June or July when we are outside and ticks are tiny.
- Wear repellants when in tick habitat and conduct daily tick checks of both people and pets.
- Too high or too low for temperature, fertility and moisture can all cause blossom drop.
- Potato beetles may also affect other Solanaceous plants like eggplant, tomatoes and peppers.

ARTICHOKE DIP

Recipe for June 2018 Thank you Jeanne Aras for these quick dip recipes

- 1 can (14 oz.) artichoke hearts ¼ cup mayo or salad dressing
 - ¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese 1 clove garlic, minced
- Assorted veggie dippers: red pepper, cucumber, carrots, etc.

Drain artichokes thoroughly – pressing to remove excess liquid. In a mixing bowl, mash artichokes. Stir in mayo, cheese and garlic. Cover and chill for several hours. Serve with assorted veggies.

CREAMY BLUE'S DIP

- 1 ½ cup sour cream 2 Tbsp. packaged onion soup mix
- ½ cup crumpled blue cheese 1/3 cup chopped walnuts

Blend sour cream, soup mix, cheese and nuts. Cover and chill for several hours. Serve with assorted raw veggies or crackers.

Recycling guidelines to prevent contamination surcharge

When non-recyclable items (contamination) end up in your recycling loads, they have the potential to turn the entire load into trash and increase processing costs resulting in contamination and/or additional service charges.



IMPORTANT: Moving forward you may be assessed contamination charges of up to \$175 per ton and/or increased processing fees for excess contamination found in your loads.*

Please join us in the battle against contamination and make sure when your recycling loads are delivered to one of Waste Management's transfer stations or a Material Recovery Facility (MRF) they are free of contaminants and follow the recycling do's and don'ts.

Recycling Do's	Recycling Don'ts
Do recycle all empty bottles, cans, paper and cardboard.	Don't bag your recyclables. Plastic bags and film get tangled in the machinery.
Do keep foods and liquids out of recycling.	Don't include food-soiled items - they can turn an entire load of recycling into trash.
Do keep plastic bags out of recycling.	Don't add sharp or dangerous materials like needles and electronics - they can cause injury to our workers.
	Don't toss in "tangles" like rubber hoses and wires - they can shut down an entire recycling center!
	Don't include bulky items like propane tanks or construction debris.

The United Nations has designated June 15 as World Elder Abuse Awareness Day

What is Elder Abuse?

In general, elder abuse refers to intentional or neglectful acts by a caregiver or “trusted” individual that leads to, or may lead to, harm of a vulnerable elder. Physical abuse; neglect; emotional or psychological abuse; verbal abuse and threats; financial abuse and exploitation; sexual abuse; and abandonment are considered forms of elder abuse. In many states, self-neglect is also considered mistreatment.

Who is at Risk?

Elder abuse can occur anywhere – in the home, in nursing homes, or other institutions. It affects seniors across all socio-economic groups, cultures, and races. Based on available information, women and “older” elders are more likely to be victimized. Dementia is a significant risk factor. Mental health and substance abuse issues – of both abusers and victims – are risk factors. Isolation can also contribute to risk.

Types of Elder Abuse

- **Physical abuse:** Use of force to threaten or physically injure an elder
- **Emotional abuse:** Verbal attacks, threats, rejection, isolation, or belittling acts that cause or could cause mental anguish, pain, or distress to a senior
- **Sexual abuse:** Sexual contact that is forced, tricked, threatened, or otherwise coerced upon a elder, including anyone who is unable to grant consent
- **Exploitation:** Theft, fraud, misuse or neglect of authority, and use of undue influence as a lever to gain control over an older person’s money or property
- **Neglect:** A caregiver’s failure or refusal to provide for a vulnerable elder’s safety, physical, or emotional needs.
- **Abandonment:** Desertion of a frail or vulnerable elder by anyone with a duty of care
- **Self-neglect:** An inability to understand the consequences of one’s own actions or inaction, which leads to, harm or endangerment.

Remember: You do not need to prove that abuse is occurring; it is up to the professionals to investigate the suspicions.
